DAN FLANNERY POOL

at Ames High School

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Long time Ames High swimming and diving coach Dan Flannery passed away unexpectedly in July 2020. His absence was greatly felt across the Ames School District and especially within the vibrant Ames swim community. He left a legacy of success and inspired hundreds, if not thousands, of young athletes to set and achieve lofty goals both in the pool and the classroom.

Dan was a prominent figure in the swimming community, not only in Ames, but across the state. In 1998, he casually agreed to start coaching the boy's program at Ames High but never saw it as a long-term committment.

Since that time, Flannery led Ames to an unprecedented run of success, especially on the girl's side where they won four-straight titles in 2010-13 and again from 2015-18. Ames also placed second in 2014 and 2019. His eight state titles on the girls' side are tied for the state record. Flannery also led the boy's team to a championship in 2018, further solidifying himself as one of the





top coaches in swimming state history. He effectively prepared Ames High athletes for collegiate swimming, helping many to compete in Division I, II, and III programs. However, if you ask any of his former students or athletes, Coach Flannery's legacy extends far beyond any awards or trophies.

In a letter of support, Ames High swimmer Maddie Bro noted that "he sent all of us out into the world with more confidence, kindness, and compassion than what we had when we first set foot on the pool deck."

He was the epitome of going above and beyond for his entire team. Any Ames High student who wanted to compete on the swimming team had a spot. "It didn't matter if you were a star swimmer, star student, or neither, he gave the same attention and care to everyone," said Bro. He cheered on "our personal victories of all kinds, even after we left the halls of Ames High."

In 2018, when the Ames community approved a bond referendum for





a new high school, Dan was there from the beginning. Through his own swimming career, and that as a coach, he had been in nearly every high school and collegiate pool in Iowa and much of the midwest. During the design phase, he provided input on nearly every aspect of the pool construction prior to his passing away.

Now that it is nearly complete, former Ames High swimmers and those in the community are asking the school board to consider memorializing his legacy by naming the pool in his honor.

In July 2020, a petition on change.org was started. As of May 2022, the petition had over 6,500 signatures of support. In addition to those signatures, this document highlights additional statements of support to name the pool at Ames High School the

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
"While Dan was with us, he accomplished so so much. His record of achievement speaks for itself - multiple girls' state swimming team championships, a boys' state team title, numerous state runner-up finishes in both boys' and girls' swimming (same with top three finishes), multiple conferences and district team titles. Individually, his swimmers were state champions, state record holders and High School All Americans and many of the top swimmers in the history of Iowa High School Swimming. He also coached several of his girls' teams to national team titles. In the history of Ames High School Athletics, no coach has accomplished more.

More importantly, Dan was a people person who cared deeply for his students and his student-athletes. The relationships he developed with the students who came in contact with him were simply incredible. I can attest to this personally. My three grandchildren who live in Ames swam for Dan. All three were devastated at his passing. He kept in contact with them after they graduated - especially my grandson who went on to swim one year at Valparaiso. When things weren't going well for him, Dan was only a phone call away and always had time for him. This isn't unique to my grandchildren. Best kid in the pool or not Dan had time for everyone.

On a much more personal note, Dan was my successor. In 1982, when I was coaching, Ames High won its first, and at that time, only boys' state team championship. In 2018, Ames High, under Dan's direction, won its second boys' title. My grandson was part of that championship team. During the trophy presentation, Dan made sure I was not only part of the celebration but later presented me with a poster sized picture of myself with the team and my grandson on the podium holding the team trophy with his teammates. That picture is one of my most prized momentos. It was and is an incredible gesture that he was willing to let me share the celebration with both him and my grandson."

"Over the years, Dan was known for creating a lane for everyone. From the beginner JV swimmer to the top varsity swimmer that would go on to the semifinals at Olympic Trials. He was such a rich and warm person that others wanted to be around. Dan led by example and shared his pursuits, dreams, and goals. His legacy lives on in the individuals he worked with, and Dan would be the first to admit that the facility is not what makes the program. It's the people within in it. His hope and dream for all of us would be to lead others to go down a special path of a sense of belonging to a bigger community of Ames Swimming as he did for so many of us along the way. 

Swimming and Diving Statistics and Accomplishments

Flannery's resume as a swimming and diving coach is unrivaled in the state of Iowa. Flannery was the head girls swimming and diving coach at Ames High from 2002 - 2020 and led the boys' program from 1998 - 2020.

Under his tenure as head girls coach, Ames' varsity dual meet record was 140-11-1. In his last ten years as the girls coach, the Little Cyclones won eight team state championships, which ranks second on lowa's all-time list. Over his last 11 years, 121 of his swimmers have earned NISCA All-American honors, 19 swimmers have won an individual state title, and 18 state records were broken by an Ames swimmer. Ames became only the third school in lowa history to win the girls swimming and boys swimming team titles in the same academic year (2018) when Flannery guided Ames High to their first boys championship since 1982.

In 2018, Flannery was named the recipient of the Iowa Girls' High School Athletic Union's Golden Plaque of Distinction Award. In November 2021, he was inducted into the Iowa High School Swim Coaches Association Hall of Fame at the IGHSAU championships.
